**Gata Gata** In the midst of the world of "gata gata", Jodo Shinshu followers are urged to hear the voice of Amida which is true, real and sincere.



Southern Alberta is known for its chinooks. Chinooks are warm and strong winds blowing over the Rocky Mountains. It blows from time to time during winter and toward spring. The snow is usually melted away in a day by the wind. Recently we had a chinook. It was an extremely strong wind. Our windows which face south west made a loud rattling and squeaking noise through the night. I woke up a couple of times during the night from these noises.

The rattling and squeaking sound reminded me of a Japanese expression, "gata gata". Japanese often use this expression in their conversation. For example, think of a Japanese shoji, a sliding door. Especially if it is still new, a sliding door and rail do not work smoothly against each other and make a noisy and squeaky sound. Japanese say, sound is "gata gata".

"Gata" literally means "self and other" or "I and you" implying two individuals or things. When they do not get along with

Another example is when you ask someone, say a senior gentleman, about his health. You might get the response from him, "Well, honestly speaking, my health is "gata gata." This means that mind and body do not agree with each other. You might think you are still young. Your mind says, "I feel I am still 40 years young." But your body says, "Are you kidding? You are 75 years old. Admit it!". Here, "gata gata" is a disagreeable sound between mind and body.

In Buddhism, it is said that our conventional thinking is characterized by all kinds of dual ideas, the idea of "two-ness": self and other, good and bad, mind and body, like and dislike, birth and death, and so on. It is no doubt that we, ordinary people, are living in this kind of relative world. The problem is that we have a very strong ego-attachment by which we grasp and cling to the one side we love and thereby we create our world of delusion.

Ignorance and blind passions abound, Pervading everywhere like particles of dust. Desire and hatred arising out of conflict and accord

Are like high peaks and mountain ridges. – Shinran

The goal of Buddhism is emancipation, to turn delusion into enlightenment. In other words, the aim of Buddha Dharma is spiritual liberation from ego binding chains.

There are numerous paths for this. Jodo Shinshu Buddhism teaches us that this goal is only actualized through the working of Amida, the true reality of oneness expressed as Namo Amida Butsu. In the midst of the world of "gata gata", Jodo Shinshu followers are urged to hear the voice of Amida which is true, real and sincere.

O CHIGO PARADE BTSA Dedication Ceremony Sunday, April 26, 2009 9:45 am | 9am in the Dharma room for participants



"Chigo" refers to children ages three to twelve. ("o" is an honorific prefex.) According to tradition, noble households in Japan sent their children to temples for their education. While attending, children participated in the temple festivals and ceremonies, often dressing up to represent celestial beings.

Both boys and girls wear a robe with long, wide sleeves over a hakama or loose trousers, and the ancient make-up of the nobility which consists of two black dots just above the space between the eyebrows. The costume is differentiated between boys and girls by a stiff hat for boys and a crown of the phoenix bird for girls.

The BTSA will provide an opportunity for children to participate in this ceremonial procession at its dedication ceremony to be held on April 26, 2009 at the BTSA. (Please come by 9am for preparation and photos in the dharma room.)

HANAMATSURI Sunday, April 12, 2009 Service begins at 2pm



Hanamatsuri, or 'Flower Festival', commemorates the birth of Siddhartha Gautama. Siddhartha became enlightened as Sakyamuni Buddha, marking the release of sentient beings from suffering.

Children and youth will participate in the offering of flowers and pouring sweet tea over a statuette of the infant Buddha. There will also be an infant presentation (Hatsumairi) in which parents formally present their child to the Buddha and members of the temple. If you have interest in your child participating, please contact Reverend Izumi.

#### **Kids' Activities**

Children will be dismissed early from service to spend time in the dharma classroom where activities will be provided. After the meal in the common area, the children will return to the dharma room for a birthday party for Buddha, celebrating with candles and cake.
