Appearance beyond human eyes

As you all notice when you come in the Hondo there is an offertory box called o-saisen-bako. The other day I saw a mother and her child standing beside the o-saisen-bako. The child wanted to put some money in it. The mother gave a coin to her child. The child put the coin in the o-saisen-bako. The child seemed to be very happy and contented. Then the mother and child quietly put their hands together in gassho. This simple act shows the spirit of dana, giving and offering before the Buddha. The mother must have taught her child the simple act in appreciation before the Buddha. It was a beautiful scene.

This reminded me of one small event which happened many years ago. One of our children, Hugh, was still three years old then. One Sunday, he asked me for a coin for the o-saisen bako before Dharma School started. I gave him a dime. He did not take it but asked me for a nickel instead. I could not understand why he wanted the nickel instead of the dime. When I gave him the nickel, he looked at it and then happily dropped it in the o-saisen-bako.

I understood why he took the nickel. It was because the nickel is much bigger than a dime. It was understandable that a three-year old child could not see how much the dime was worth. My son picked the nickel just because the nickel was bigger than the dime. In his eyes, the appearance was more important than its content, its true value. His judgment was according to its appearance and not according to its content.

In Buddhism we talk about human eyes or naked eyes and Buddha's eyes or wisdom eyes. The human eyes see the appearance of things only superficially and judge, saying good or bad, pure or impure, beautiful or ugly, expensive or cheap. We often fail to see the contents or true value in appearances. On the other hand, Buddha's eyes can see the contents or true value in or behind the appearances clearly as they are.

Our otera, Buddhist temple, was built almost exactly three years ago. The first Hoonko service at the new temple was held on January 25, 2009. It was the first service at our new temple. Three years later, we are sitting in the same temple Hondo. I am sure you all appreciate the new temple. You all appreciate its appearance, its structure which is very beautiful. We can see it.

I think, however, there is much more value inside the temple than mere appearance. Through Buddha's eyes I can clearly see the dedication of so many members and non-members when we built the temple. We received lots of help and support when we built the temple. I can see now the help and support in the beautiful appearance of the temple. I can see their monetary contribution, their labour, their time, their vision here inside of the temple, beyond its appearance. We all wanted the dharma to spread. We all wanted to share Buddha's teaching with others. I can see their spirit of dana, giving and offering in the building. It is, indeed, not easy to truly see things as they are clearly and correctly only by human eyes, naked eyes.

Through Buddha's eyes, I can now gradually see invisible connections behind the appearances. And I appreciate it.

Buddha-dharma gives us an eye to see something beyond the tangible and visible, something beyond form. Amida's light of wisdom and compassion helps us to see the true value, true contents inside the beautiful appearance of our temple. With deep gratitude and joy we say Namo Amida Butsu.

BTSA NOTES

Notice of the BTSA 2012 Annual General Meeting – Please regard this as official notification that the 2012 AGM will be held March 4, 2011, following the monthly memorial service for that month. The BTSA by-law requiring at least 15 days written notice prior to the date of the annual general meeting was amended at the 2011 AGM allowing official notification of an AGM by an announcement in the Hikari.

We look forward to members participating in the annual general meeting on March 4. As in the past, elections to the board will be a major item. Elections are necessary to fill six board positions with that number completing their two-year terms. A seventh person will have to be elected to bring the total to 12. Currently, five members elected last year will continue until the 2013 AGM.

The staggering of six positions was approved at the 2009 AGM. Several current board members have indicated they will not stand for re-election. All BTSA members are eligible and are encouraged to offer their names for nomination, either by letting the executive know in advance or allowing their names to be nominated at the AGM.

Since the amalgamation in 2006 and the dedication of the new temple in 2009, many of the challenging chores and demands have been met. Most temple duties have been regularized but they still require leaders to be executed smoothly. Minimally, the board meets monthly with a recess during August; we're asking potential board members to devote two hours each month for meetings. Your energy, support and a sense of responsibility are vital to the temple and most welcomed.

Our food donation box is slowly filling up with non-perishables that will eventually be given to the Lethbridge Food Bank this year. Members still have time to contribute until the end of February, at which time we will estimate the monetary value of the donations and match it with a cheque from BTSA. Please give us a hand in this community involvement effort.

The first month of the year always brings with it recharged energy and ideas fuelled by a sense of renewal. The year ended on Dec. 31 with a large turnout at the Joya-no-Kane (bell ringing ceremony) co-sponsored by the temple and the Nikka Yuko Gardens. The sudden change in the weather didn't deter hardly would-be bell-ringers to join Izumi sensei at the bonsho (Garden bell) to strike it 108 times. Sensei led a New Year's service the following Sunday with more than 30 attendees.

A huge turnout for Ho-onko, coupled with the monthly memorial for January, was followed by the New Year's party for which Toban Four prepared a generous and delicious supper. The fare of chow mein and sweet and sour ribs was enhanced by plenty of sashimi (tuna and sockeye salmon) and libations to toast the new year. All this was followed by a boisterous bingo session where many remained to enjoy the socializing. Thanks to everyone for their generosity, assistance and ongoing support.

As well look forward to this year, we invite anyone interested in serving as emcee or looking after the sound system during Sunday services to let us know of your interest. It's always nice to involve as many members as possible to fulfill these vital roles. With many people helping out, the responsibility is shared and the frequency of serving can be reduced.

The board at its January meeting approved a revised set of guidelines for the rental of various portions of the temple. The guidelines have been inserted in the Room Reservation binder in the front foyer. They also have been posted on the BTSA website along with a number of other important documents. They can be accessed by going to the homepage and clicking on the "Temple" page in the menu. Please note too that the website design has been changed, thanks to our webmaster Kristie Masuda. We hope everyone finds it attractive and easy to get around.

Dharma Class Notes

A new format for the dharma classes has been initiated in light of the increased numbers and a broader range of ages in attendees. Staff volunteers are Maya Ichikawa, Andrew Ichikawa, Brenda Ikuta, Tahirih Rempel and Lorita Ichikawa. Sheila Oishi is also on the Dharma School Committee, which met in January. Dharma children and youth are now divided into two groups. Pre-School to Grade 1 is led by Maya with Tahirih assisting. Although we don't have space or staffing for daycare, toddlers can be accommodated with Lorita assisting. Parents are asked to stay with children under two. Grade 2 and up (ages 8-12) will be led by Andrew. Brenda will lead or assist in either group as needed.

Dharma classes will start before sensei's message and end at 11:30 when parents may pick them up for tea. On occasion the youth group may stay for sensei's message. There will be Dharma classes for special services (next is Hanamatsuri in April) and the monthly Shotsuki. Any cancellations of dharma classes will be conveyed through Maya's regular e-mails to parents. Two classrooms using the room divider are being used, however occasionally a portion of the multipurpose room or the boardroom may be necessary. As the garden has been difficult to maintain, it will be taken out and replaced with more flowers and sod in order to increase the play area. Marko Hilgersom has volunteered to do this.

Due to safety issues, additional cones for the parking lot are being requested. It was also suggested that the basketball net and other outdoor equipment (table etc.) be grounded in concrete as there is no convenient storage area in proximity to the dharma class and items are difficult to move in and out quickly. There is a need for additional furnishings and class resources, which will be purchased in the near future. A laptop computer approved by the Board for purchase has already been used to enhance dharma activities.

As some youth have expressed an interest in being MC for services, Roland Ikuta has agreed to pair with them when he is chair. Lisa Sakamoto and Charlotte Ikuta will train interested youth as runners at the next chow mein supper. Most recently youth did the calling at the New Year's party bingo. Members will continue to have the opportunity of sharing their interests and skills with the dharma kids. Lorita will contact those interested to share a project.
