Nembutsu Sangha



The Teaching of Buddha identifies three different types of organizations as follows: First is the organization based on power, wealth and authority of leaders. Second is the organization based on convenience and the interests of its members. Third is the organization based on good teachings and, whereby, members experience spiritual liberation.

A Buddhist organization is, of course, not merely a social gathering place which exists as long as people get along with each other. At a place of gathering, people shake hands, hug, and laugh, or sometimes cry together. This is fine. But this does not necessarily reflect an ideal Buddhist organization. In our organization called the Jodo Shinshu Nembutsu Sangha, we listen to the teaching that Master Shinran (1173-1263) taught for us, namely, "Buddha-Centered Life" based on Nembutsu teaching.

Nembutsu means a compassionate call of the Buddha which is working amid our "Self-Centered Life". At our organization, the attachment of our small self or ego-self is always reflected and constantly crushed by the working of Buddha's light of wisdom and compassion, so that we become one with the Buddha. The thick wall created by our ego-self,

We are taught that from the time we hear and receive the great compassionate heart of the Buddha, birth in the Pure Land of Nirvana, has already started. In this sense, Buddhism is not talking about life after physical death. Master Shinran talked about the way to truly live here and now. Drawn by the Buddha's wisdom and compassion, we return effortlessly to the land of true awakening of life. This is our Sangha which belongs to the third type of organization mentioned above.

A snake casts off old skin from the new skin, crawls out of its old skin to new life. The snake which cannot shed its skin, I heard, has to die in vain. How sad it is! Master Shinran said: if we had not encountered the compassionate working of Buddha, our transmigration in birth-and-death has no end; what could we do then, sinking in this sea of pain and affliction? Thus, he encourages us to meet the Buddha here and now and experience spiritual liberation, individually and personally. Otherwise, our life would have been in vain.

Yes, the "Buddha-Centred Life" is indeed constantly and always casting off our old skin of ego to the new life, the life of spiritual liberation!

宗教ということ

新年早々、パリにある風刺画で有名な出版社が、イスラム教の過激派2人によって襲撃されるという事件が起こりました。警官を含む12人が殺され、それと時を同じくして、近くの食料店が、やはりイスラム教の過激派によって占領され、5人が殺害されました。この襲撃は、イスラム教予言者モハメッドを風刺したということが原因の一つになっているようです。「言論(表現)の自由」と「宗教感情」とのもつれが大きな惨事をもたらしました。それにしても、このような殺人事件が、近代都市で白昼堂々と行われる、ということに言い知れぬ恐れと驚きを感じます。

この事件を受け、その翌日、ローマ法王と4人のイスラム教徒の代表が話し合っています。そこでは、「宗教対話の必要性」、「言論の自由の大切さ」が確認され、報道関係には対しては「宗教の尊重」を呼びかけています。21世紀は「宗教戦争」がいよいよ拡大される時代と言われてきましたが、その感をいよいよ強くします。「宗教」とは「教えを宗とする」と書かれています。教えを聞かねばならないのは、自己中心的で不完全な私たち一人ひとりでしょう。宗教の目的は、自分の教えを謙虚に聞き、それを日々の生活に生かしていく、というところにあることを、この度の事件を通して改めて思わされました。

Ho-onko & NYParty

A sizeable crowd turned out for the annual Ho-onko service on Jan. 11, commemorating the death of the founder, Shinran Shonin. It also was the monthly memorial for the month and was followed by the New Year's Party.

The choir sang two songs and led the congregation in "Ho-onko no Uta" (In Praise of Shinran) during the service. In his dharma talk, sensei mentioned the apparent contradiction in having an happy occasion (the party) at the same time as a memorial (Shinran's death). "But from a Jodo Shinshu point of view it is not necessarily right thinking," he said. "Because Master Shinran said: All nembutsu followers have perfectly realized Buddha-Centered Life, they will be born in complete Nirvana, Pure Land, on the eve of the time of death, the moment we discard our physical life.

Master Shinran taught that the time of death is the moment of Birth for those who are awakened to the life of Buddha, the life of ego-less-ness, the life of non-ego attachment."

Those in attendance enjoyed a meal catered by the New Dynasty Restaurant and an evening of playing bingo.



Q. Why is the image of the Buddha of Jodo Shinshu standing?

A. Buddha's virtues are expressed as wisdom and compassion. The image of a sitting Buddha symbolises wisdom to see the true reality of life, oneness, as it is. For those who are not able to comprehend it but create the life of duality in which they suffer, Buddha's wisdom manifests itself in compassion. The image of a standing Buddha symbolizes compassion. Jodo Shinshu (Shin Buddhism) revealed by Master Shinran (1173-1263) is for ordinary, common and spiritually-ignorant beings, such as ourselves. Therefore, when we visit any Jodo Shinshu Temple in Japan, North America or other locations, we will always see the image of the standing Buddha in the center of the shrine. In front of the standing Buddha we reflect on ourselves and, at the same time, appreciate Buddha's compassion that is always embracing us. (Y.I.)


THE BUDDHIST TEMPLE OF SOUTHERN ALBERTA children & youth dharma classes

Thank you to Abby McMeekin for her Dharma class lesson about compassion. Borrowing from the concept of *Tonglen*, a meditative practice based in Tibetan Buddhism, Abby explained:


"Technically this is a meditation where you sit and first think of sending loving compassion to yourself, then to other people you love, then expand the compassion out to people you don't know - to animals - to the earth (water, mountains etc.) and finally to people who you have difficulty with. Explaining that when we send compassion to people we may not like very much, our ability to have compassion for people increases AND we may actually improve our understanding of the person that we have difficulty with - perhaps understand why they are a bully or take negative action (e.g., because they don't feel good about themselves). The phrase that you say is usually 'May you be free of suffering and know the roots of happiness'. The whole process is to widen our hearts and increase our level of compassion towards others."

From this the students drew themselves and extended their compassion out to drawings of friends, family, nature, animals, etc., chatting about who/what they chose and how they feel about sending all that kindness out into the world.

- Feb. 8 Class teaching: Empathy or "Put yourself in another's shoes"
- During Feb. 15th's class there will be special focus on animals and specifically pets, to coincide with the pet memorial service.
