# **Two Kinds of Approaches**



About 30 years ago a salesman came to our house to sell us a vacuum cleaner. Since our vacuum was getting old we had been thinking of buying a new one. So, I asked the man to give us a demonstration in our living room of how the vacuum worked. It was very powerful and he indicated it was a commercial model. When I asked him how much it costs, he replied "\$2,000". My wife immediately whispered to my ears that it was too expensive. I told the salesman that it was too expensive and that we could not afford that price. He then immediately reduced the price to \$1,500 and his voice took on a threatening and aggressive tone as he said loudly, "I spent some time with you to do this demonstration. Why don't you buy it?" I did not like the way he talked to me so I told him I would not buy it. He then began to beg and implore with a pitiful tone and said, "I have to sell this vacuum today. How about \$1,000? Please buy it." We then continued to talk until we reluctantly decided to buy it. Fortunately it was a good deal and it is still working today.

The point of my story is to describe how people often use two kinds of approaches or techniques to make others give way to what they want. One is to use a threatening manner (a top-down approach) and the other is to plead or implore for help (a bottom-up approach). In both cases it is often selfish desires and manipulation that are behind the motivation of persuasion, leaving bad feelings behind.

I sometimes encounter similar approaches or techniques from "religious people" who try to convert others to their religions. When I listen to them it usually entails bad feeling in my mind because I feel they have some kind of strong religious ego in them.

There are two skilful methods that the Buddha uses to convince and guide others to the Dharma. One is called "embracing "and the other is "breaking". The "embracing" corresponds to Buddha's boundless compassion that embraces our blind passion of greed, anger and folly. The "breaking" corresponds to Buddha's infinite wisdom that breaks our blind passions. In both cases, since Buddha's true and sincere mind of oneness is behind the motivation of sharing, (not manipulation), it leaves us with a good feeling about the experience. It makes us feel grateful and joyous and eventually guides us to the realm of enlightenment of true awakening. "Namo Amida Butsu" we recite is a natural response of our joy and gratitude to Buddha's continuous working of embracing and breaking.

### JULY & AUGUST Service Schedule

Informal services with chanting and dharma talks are scheduled for July 25, and Aug. 8, 15, 22 and 29, moderated by assigned emcees. The regular Sunday service schedule resumes on Sept. 5 at 10:30 a.m. with the monthly memorial for that month.

Please be reminded that the BTSA Obon on July 18 begins with the cemetery visitation at 1 p.m. The service at the temple is at 2:30 p.m., with guest speaker Patricia Usuki sensei of San Fernando Valley (California) Buddhist Temple. The July and August monthly memorial services will be combined with the obon service. Supper will follow with a full Japanese meal prepared by Toban Four. Usuki sensei also will be speaking at a dharma gathering at 7 p.m. that will be open to the public.

#### Bon Odori Japanese Dance Festival

The Bon Odori is a Japanese Buddhist folk dance performed outdoors in a circle around a taiko on a raised platform decorated with lanterns. Obon is a dance of joy, a time to remember and honor all those who have passed on, appreciate all that they have done for us and to recognize the continuation of their influence upon our lives. It is also a time of self-reflection that reminds us to practice Dana (self-less giving) to family, friends, and all beings.

The seventh annual Bon Odori takes place on July 17, 2010 at 6:30 p.m. at the Galt Gardens. Once again it will be a festive occasion with traditional Japanese dress, music and dancing. David Tanaka and Kynan Gordon, Taiko, will open the program at 7pm followed by the chanting of San Bujo by Izumi Sensei. Deanna Jones, Master of Ceremonies, will introduce the dances and other entertainment. Aya Hironaka, dance instructor has been working with the dancers since the beginning of June and they will perform several familiar dances. All who attend, children and adults are invited to join the circle of dancers and fully participate in any or all of the dances.

Global Drums of the University of Lethbridge will be on hand for Taiko entertainment during the dance intermission. Global Drums performs exciting traditional music from around the world on authentic instruments. Performing with large and small ensembles at summer festivals, public and private, they also travel internationally on tours that included a trip to Japan. Also performing will be Charlotte Ikuta and Katie Nakagawa with Roland Ikuta leading a sing-along.

Bazaar items will include Dharma Dogs (Japanese style hot dogs), Yakitori (grilled chicken and beef skewers), Nigiri (rice balls), and the traditional kori or snow cones. Handmade rice-sack aprons and tea towels will also be on sale. Several activities and crafts are planned for children, including yoyo balloon fishing, made popular in Japan. Bazaar tables are also being made available to the Nikka Yuko Japanese Garden and the Nikkei Cultural Society to as part the event's cultural awareness.


