My life has now reached the fullness of its years. It is certain that I will go to birth in the Pure Land before you, so without fail I will await you there. - Shinran Shonin (1173-1263)



Reflecting deeply on our life, it is a series of parting and separation. We must part from our parents, brothers and sisters one day. Husband

and wife must part from each other no matter how much they love each other. Sometimes a child leaves before parents. Furthermore, when time comes all forms of life will disappear from our own eyes. Meeting is indeed the beginning of parting.

Where are we going after we die? In the sutra it says: *People are ignorant and foolish, and yet they think themselves wise. They do not know from where life comes or to where death leads.* Therefore, we must humbly listen to the Buddha, the awakened one.

Some people say, "Well, when we die that is it." When I hear people say this, I say, "that's right. Therefore, we must hear good teaching now." Or someone, actually a scientist in Japan, once said, "When we die we will become waste." I think this kind of observation about life is very sad. Are we living and working hard every day to become just waste?

A middle-aged mother listened to Buddha's teachings well, and appreciated and entrusted herself to Amida's great compassion. One day she was diagnosed with cancer. Before her passing, her daughter told her mother with tears, "Thank you mom for everything." The

I will be born in the Pure Land of Amida, become a Buddha and then I will guide you to Amida's home. You know, we will meet again in Amida's home, Pure Land. So, you must live strong. Please listen to the story of Amida Buddha and live your life to the fullest." The mother appreciated Amida's vow by which Amida fulfilled the Pure Land for each of us who are in the world delusion.

In the Amida Sutra expounded by Shakyamuni Buddha, there is a passage: The Buddha spoke: Sariputra, the people who hear of the Pure Land should aspire to be born there. Why? It is because they will be able to meet together with good friends and teachers there.

In Japan, many cemeteries are located in temple property. Each gravestone is upright and not flat lying on the ground as many are in the West. The front of each gravestone is engraved with the words of *namo amida butsu* or *kue-issho*, meaning "Meeting together in one place." One place, of course, means the Pure Land, Amida's home.

Our life, as we know, is the place where meeting is always the beginning of parting. Parting from our loved ones is always sad and painful. And yet, when we listen and hear Amida's call of *namo amida butsu*, we realize that parting is not the end. We will meet again in the Pure Land of peace and happiness. Pure Land, Amida's home, will become our home.

Ghotanye Service May 23



Those who realize shinjin-entrusting heart, which is Other Power "revere the dharma of the nembutsu and greatly rejoice in it, and therefore are my true companions." Such is the praise of Shakyamuni Buddha, the master of the teaching. --Shinran

On May 23 the BTSA observed the birth of Shinran--founder of Jodo Shinshu--with a virtual Ghotanye service, recorded and

uploaded on its You Tube site. Shinran's birth on May 21, 1173, in Hino, Japan, occurred during Japan's Heian Period.

As Izumi sensei noted the meaning of ghotan refers to "someone whose descent and appearance from a sacred place or the world of truth" marks him as a great teacher. He said the historical Buddha's birth may properly referred to similarly.

In his dharma message, sensei distinguished "we ordinary people whose lives are based on blind passions or bonno of greed, anger and foolishness" from people like Shinran, who despite being venerated always referred to himself as an imperfect and foolish being.

"Shinran acknowledge that such foolish beings realized that Amida's call (the nembutsu) is working to liberate them to the Pure Land of Bliss," sensei noted. He added that "Shinran taught us 'entrusting heart' (to Amida) is the cause of birth and recitation of namo amida butsu is the expression of our gratitude to Amida."

Dr. Roland Ikuta emceed the service.

"The Golden Chain" is written in a simple style explaining the ethical teaching of Buddhism, especially to our children. It encourages and nurtures kindness and love for all beings. It is our hope that children become aware of their inner strength to protect the lives of other people and animals. This short saying inspires not only children, but adults, to pursue the goodness of human life, through the teachings of the interdependence of all things and all living things. It reminds us of the responsibility of helping one another regardless of ethnicity or colour of our skin.


