# **SENSEI**



Ever since I came to Canada as a Buddhist minister at the age of 26, members and friends of the Buddhist temples have called me a 'sensei', for which I am grateful. 'Sensei' literally means one who was born earlier. It means an 'elder'. Even though I was young, elderly members who came to the temple called me 'sensei'. I have almost taken it for granted. When I think about it, this is indeed a great title and honor. The term 'sensei' is usually translated in the West as 'teacher' or 'expert' in any field, such as judo, karate, tea ceremony, flower arrangement and also in the world of business. There are many sense is / experts in all kinds of fields these days.

In the field of Buddha Dharma (Buddhism), however, I think that a historical Buddha alone is a genuine 'sensei' and an 'expert' since he is a discoverer of Truth (Dharma) for our spiritual liberation.

Venerable Shinran (1173-1263) never referred to himself as a 'teacher' of the Buddha Dharma. He was always a humble and sincere listener of the Truth, the Dharma.

In his poem he wrote:

And cannot distinguish false and true;
I lack even small love
and small compassion,
And yet, like to be called 'teacher of people' for fame and profit.

Of course, he knew right from wrong and he was able to distinguish what was false from true in a relative sense; but, he examined and reflected on himself, his egoself, truly and deeply in the light of absolute wisdom and compassion of the Buddha, and found he was ashamed of himself. Thus, his poem of a deep sense of shame was born. The sense of shame is a natural consequence in religious life. It is said that those who have no sense of 'shame' are called a 'beast' and are not human. Perhaps, only humans may feel 'shame' when they stand before true and real life.

Venerable Shinran was a compassionate individual and always humble before the Buddha. He did not claim himself to be a teacher of the Dharma. Rather he said "I have no disciples." He did not even claim himself to be the founder of the new school called Jodo Shinshu (The True Essence of Pure Land). It was his followers who called Venerable Shinran the founder and the teacher of the new school. He did not seek fame or personal profit. He was not a glory-seeker. And yet, beyond time and place, he has been respected and admired by millions of people in the world today long after his passing. Why is this so? I think it is because people in any age admire someone who lives a true and real life.

**Reminder:** Please avoid wearing fragrances of any sort, especially while working in the kitchen with food preparation. This is with respect to those with breathing problems as well as to avoid transfer to the taste of foods.

# "Difficult is it to hear the teachings of the Buddha..."

Since the Temple's opening, a common complaint is that it is difficult to hear important information whether you have a hearing loss or not. The first step was to improve the overall acoustics of the large and echoing Hondo and Multipurpose Room. We also projected the speaker's face on the Hondo side screens for those who find lipreading helpful in understanding a message. These strategies are insufficient for many hard of hearing people who have particular difficulty understanding speech in group settings. Their hearing aids are not sufficient to control for the combined factors of hearing loss, poor acoustics of the environment and possible problems with speech discrimination.

As a next step, the BTSA has begun trialing a FM system for the Hondo. With the help of Rytch Newmiller from the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Society we have started a one-month trial with 6 volunteers who are currently having difficulty hearing the messages in the Hondo. The volunteers wear earphones connected to battery-operated receivers. We have installed a transmitter, which picks up the signal from Sensei's mic and delivers it right to the listeners' ears so they don't get interference from background noise or the effects of poor hall acoustics. This system can transmit up to 1000 feet so the volunteers can sit anywhere in the Hondo (in the Temple for that matter) and hear the message with same loudness and clarity. The volunteers have a variety of headphones to sample for comfort and personal preference (e.g. some like to be able to hear their neighbor, others like to block out all sound except the message coming from the main speaker).

Sunday, May 19 was the first day of the trial, Rytch was available to fit the volunteers with receivers and earphones. He adjusted the transmitter to maximize the sounds they were receiving. He also made himself available to answer any questions after the service. Rytch will continue to work closely with the BTSA for the length of the trial so that we get the best outcomes possible for our members. Already we have had positive comments from the volunteers who said they "heard every single word of Sensei's message for the first time" and some weren't aware they had been missing so much information until they tried the FM system.

If anyone has questions or comments about the system, please direct them to Brenda Ikuta or Akira Ichikawa. You can catch us on most Sundays at the Temple or contact us via phone or email (see below). The Board wants to make well-informed decisions and maximize the running of the temple for the benefit of all of the congregation. This system will allow greater inclusion and participation of hard of hearing members in the various programs and services of the Temple.

Over 100,000 Bhutanese lived in U.N. run refugee camps in Nepal established in the early 1990's - some had lived there for nearly two decades. Canada was one of eight countries that committed to the resettlement of these refugees - between 2007 to the present, a total of 6,500 people.

Since 2007 the refugees have settled in 21 communities across Canada including Lethbridge. With over 500 Bhutanese here and more to come, they are becoming one of the larger ethnic communities in Lethbridge.

## 2013 JSBTC/JSBTC WF AGM REPORTS

JSBTC AGM

Delegates representing BTSA at the JSBTC AGM on April 26 and 27 were Roland Ikuta and Joyce Shigehiro

The weekend started April 26 with a pre-AGM meeting with delegates from across Canada attending. There were 48 delegates and ministers representing most of the temples from the JSBTC. The temples represented were Steveston, Vancouver, Fraser Valley, Vernon, Kelowna, Calgary, BTSA, Winnipeg, Toronto, and Hamilton. Montreal and Kamloops were not able to send delegates.

The activities began with a team-building session for the delegates, which was expertly facilitated by Trudy Gallagher, a member of the Calgary Buddhist Temple. She has previously facilitated sessions for the JSBTC board of directors and the Ministerial Association. The session highlighted some of the new and positive programs that have been occurring at temples across the country. It was an excellent session and many very positive ideas were shared.

After a pasta and pizza dinner at Luigi's the delegates attended a pre-AGM meeting. This session was primarily to go over the financial situation of the JSBTC. This current year due to the bishop only being a part time position and the ability to rent out the bishop's residence the national organization had a surplus budget. It was recommended that the assessments for 2013 remain at \$65 per person.

The following morning started with the opening service. The delegates then participated in the AGM. Several decisions were made during the AGM:

- 1. It was announced that Rev James Martin would be the Minister advisor to the women's federation.
- 2. It was announced that the board of directors selected Rev T. Aoki from Vancouver to be the new part time bishop and that Rev Grant Ikuta would not serve a second term. This was because, Steveston Buddhist temple did not support Rev Grant in being both the part time bishop and the resident minister for Steveston. Rev Aoki had support from the Vancouver temple to take on both tasks.
- 3. The financial reports were approved with the assessment for members of each temple remaining at \$65 per person. The JSTBC is expected to run a slight deficit budget this year which will be off set by the surplus from 2012.
- 4.Each temple presented a brief summary of temple activities and highlights for the other members of the JSTBC.
- 5.Susan Huntley provided a summary of the preparation for the WWF2015 convention including a slide show presentation.
- 6. There will be an attempt to revive the National committee to help coordinate the Living Dharma Center in Toronto. Each temple was asked to select a member from their board who could participate in regular (3-4 times per year) teleconference meetings.
- 7. There was an election of new board members. There

were 4 vacancies with 7 nominees. The following are the new board for the JSTBC:

- Larry Wakisaka Vice President (term ends 2014) from Toronto Buddhist Church
- Arnie Hayashi Secretary (term ends 2015) from Vernon Buddhist Temple
- Itoko Akune Treasurer (term ends 2015) from Steveston Buddhist Temple
- Amy Wakisaka Director (term ends 2015) from Toronto Buddhist Church
- Susan Huntley Director (term ends 2015) from Calgary Buddhist Temple
- Sylvia Oishi Director (term ends 2015) from BTSA
- Greg Chor President (term ends 2014) from Vancouver Buddhist Temple
- Rev. Tomofumi Fujii Minister Association Chair (ex-officio)
- Rev. Tatsuya Aoki Bishop-elect (ex-officio)
- David Ohori previous President (ex-officio)

The meeting was concluded early. A banquet with food provided by LA chefs was held at the temple on Saturday evening. There was a brief program with the Junior Taiko drummers, the Junior Minyo dancers and Katie Nakagawa and Sway Nishimura performing.

In summary the JSBTC meeting transpired with no difficulties and the delegates expressed a great deal of appreciation to the BTSA for hosting the meeting. Thanks to Akira Ichikawa and various members who helped in making the event run so smoothly.

Next years AGM will be held in Vancouver Buddhist Temple.
