The foundation of Buddha's

teachings is called "three dharma seals." A seal is used as evidence of authenticity. All Buddhist schools must have three dharma seals. Otherwise, these are not called Buddhism. So, what are the three dharma seals?

They are: impermanence, non-ego and nirvana. Impermanence means that everything changes and nothing remains unchanged. For example, we are born, get old, become sick and die. No one can deny it. Furthermore, our body is interdependently composed of many element--water, blood, skin, flesh and bone, etc.—that change interdependently and lacks an ego. Shakyamuni Buddha discovered these truths and lived accordingly.

Dharma in kanji character implies flowing water, like that of a river.We are able to cross the same river but not the same water.Water constantly flows naturally from on high downward with no ego attachment.

The Buddha is like a skillful swimmer who knows the natural flow of life and swims accordingly. He was the man who became one with the natural flow of life. No struggle and no fighting. There is no ego to disturb. The Buddha truly enjoys life. He smiles at life. There is a peace and tranquility within

So, nirvana is not some kind of location. It is a state of mind, Buddha's mind, the mind of oneness and naturalness, non-ego, peace and happiness.

On the other hand, we are not one with the dharma's natural flow of life. We are not a skillful swimmer like Shakyamuni Buddha. We do not see the river's current clearly and correctly. We have little wisdom to see and accept it as is. We are not one with water. We struggle, fight, complain and fear the flow of life, then we sink. We sink to the bottom of delusion and suffering. Is this not true of the foolish, ego-bound beings such as we?

How do the dharma seals relate to the nembutsu, namo amida butsu, we often talk about?

Nambutsu, namo amida butsu, is the call of Amida Buddha, the Buddha of wisdom and compassion who makes us realize our foolish selves and at the same time works for spiritual liberation of all sentient beings. Those of us who experience constant disagreeableness in life, struggle, fear and cry over our own ignorance and helplessness, are embraced by Amida and liberate from delusion and suffering.

Shinran Shonin said: When we reflect on the Vow of Amida Buddha, we find that this Buddha, without abandoning sentient beings in pain and affliction, has taken the directing of virtue to them as foremost, thus fulfilling the mind of great compassion.

Amida's compassion never abandons us but envelops us as we are. When we encounter Amida's working, the word, namo amida butsu bubbles out from our mouth in deep gratitude and appreciation. We live this life, our life, courageously with peace of mind.

Gotanye

Shinran Shonin, founder of our Jodo Shinshu sect, was born May 21, 1173. and BTSA will be observing his birthday--Gotanye in Japanese-- at the regular Sunday service on May 20 at 10:30 a.m.

He was given the name Matsuwakamaro at birth, and went by several other names in his lifetime. Shinran died on Jan. 16, 1263, at the age of 90. His death is one of the major Jodo Shinshu commemorations, called Ho-onko, observed during the month of January.

Grant Ikuta Sensei's TED talk

Grant Ikuta sensei's version of his TED talk on Apr. 7 involved Teaching Enlightenment Dharma and was entitled "Of Curious Encounters and Buddhist Stories."

Sensei, resident minister of the Steveston B.C. Buddhist Temple, gave a public talk a day before his guest appearance at BTSA's Hanamatsuri and shotsuki service.

Ikuta sensei recounted a history of the Hongwanji, the mother temple in Kyoto, along with that of Shinran, founder of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism, before leading the group in chanting an English version of Shinran's major work, Shoshinge.



Translation 14

This is a continuation of translations of Kudensho (Note On Oral Transmission) begun in the September, 2016 Hikari. Kudensho is a Jodo Shinshu historic text believed to have been written by Kakunyo (1270-1351), a great-grandson of Shinran, and translated by Rev. Phillip Eidmann and Rev. Yasuo Izumi.

Shinran Shonin Visiting Ango-in As A Messenger

Once Shinran spoke: "When teacher Genku of Kurodani was vigorously propagating Jodo Shinshu, people (including the Superior One - Emperor), who were adhering in prejudice against it, filled the whole country. Thus, in order to destroy the principles of the establishment of the new school, using the occasion of the previous service which was conducted for seven days at the Imperial Court (Seikaku¹of Ango-in being the officiating preacher), there was an Imperial order: 'There shall be no Pure Land teaching such as Jodo Shinshu beside the various teachings of the Path of Sages.' However, obedient to the Imperial command, while Seikaku thought to protect the main intention of his teacher Genku, he did not expand the disruption; rather he said, 'The arising of a Pure Land teaching outside of the Path of Sages can be a great benefit to the ordinary man's direct entrance.'

"Then, on hearing of the whole matter that happened in the court, Genku thought: 'If we are abolished, how can the principles of Jodo stand?' So, he decided to send a man to Ango-in. As he chose among them for the duty, thinking, 'Who shall It be?', Genku decided, 'It should be the duty of Zenshin (Shinran).' Among his colleagues, the same opinion was given out, 'That person is the most fitting.' I, Shinran, thereupon strenuously declined more than once. However, it being hard to excuse himself because of teacher's order, I decided to go to the Ango-in as a messenger.

"Hereupon, I asked: 'Can someone accompany me since it is a very important matter?' Genku said: 'That Is true. Zenshaku (Saii) will accompany you.' We both went to the residence of Ango-in and asked to see Seikaku. His attendant told them that he was bathing.When Seikaku asked, 'Who is the messenger?' the attendant said: 'Shinran has come.' Then, he was greatly surprised, thinking, 'It is a rare chance to meet this messenger. Something must be serious.' He quickly came out of the bathroom to meet them face to face."

I explained in detail the principles spoken by Genku. Seikaku said: "What you explained has been my thought for years. How could I take it lightly? Even though it is an Emperor's order, I cannot destroy teacher's pronouncement. Before I accepted the Imperial order, I stated that one should not confuse or disorder the two schools of the Path of Sages and the Path of the Pure Land. This, however, is because I lay more weight of respect on the Dharma Techer than on an Emperor's order, he should put his mind at ease."

There is no time to detail in full this whole session: Then, I returned and explained the whole session at the court with the preacher; and in front of Genku, without dropping a word, I again told the direct conversation. Then Genku asked Saii who had been urged to accompany me, "Are there any errors in what he said?"

Saii replied: "I have heard the preaching of the dharma at both places. It transcends words."

Among the three hundred eighty odd followers, Shinran was said to be the foremost disciple and said to be clever. He had been well selected, and, he had accomplished this mission. Moreover, Saii added to his words of testimony: Was this perhaps not just the same the testimony of Prabhutaratna²? This matter was, in the time of the great teacher, an appropriate recognition.

Although Shinran was not less unworthy than the predecessors in ability as a preacher, he swore an oath before Honen, "I shall cease to be a teacher of men or a preceptor." Henceforth, he did not flatter the dana³ givers, nor act at their command.

About that time, Joshin who became Shinran's disciple later finished a construction of a large temple. He repeatedly Invited him but Shinran strongly declined to the very end. Although, at that time, Shinran was a provisional personage, he, being as the same as the corrupt and dissolute ordinary man, showed that the error of an Impure preaching of the Dharma was a grave matter.

²Prabhutaratna: the name of ancient Buddha of abundant treasures. According to the Lotus Sutra, this Buddha appeared before Sakyamuni Buddha and testified his discourse of Dharma to be true. ³dana: giving, generosity and caring

Hanamatsuri

The annual Hanamatsuri service Apr. 8 drew a large crowd, with about 30 guests from the Southminster United Church. Grant Ikuta sensei of the Steveston Buddhist Temple was the guest minister for the commemoration of the birth of the historic Buddha, Shakyamuni. The service was combined with the monthly memorial service (shotsuki) for April.

The traditional hanamido--a flowered canopy--was set up, with the baby Buddha in the center over which sweet tea was poured by children. It is said that a gentle sweet rain fell at the time Buddha was born in Lumbini (present-day Nepal) in 480 BCE (Before the Common Era).

Packages of goodies were distributed to the children in attendance, and entertainment was provided by dancers Asha Ichikawa and Bronwyn Taylor; and Dean and Duncan Jacobs; pianists Mayah Van Sluys, Seiji HIlgersom and Akeo Ichikawa.

The visitors from Southminster were welcomed by Roland Ikuta, the MC. They were invited to attend after a young member, Natalie Petherick, asked about Hanamatsuri and a member of BTSA and of Southminster serving on the Nikka Yuko Garden Society exchanged messages to set up the visit.
