Two expressions: Funeral Service and Celebration of life



When someone dies, we usually have a funeral service. In recent years I frequently began hearing people say "celebration of life" instead of funeral service. I have been thinking of the difference between the two expressions for some time: a funeral service and "celebration of life."

The Buddhist funeral service is not only a time to show respect and gratitude for those who are left behind but also a time to reflect on our own mortal life. For Buddhists, reflection of mortal life--the life of impermanence--becomes an opportunity to awaken to Buddha's great compassion which is working in our lives. Buddhism always encourages us to see life clearly. We should not act like an ostrich which puts its head in the sand when an enemy comes. The Buddhist attitude is: Try to look at reality as it is, don't try to avoid it or try to ignore it.

There is a Buddhist saying: to know the life of impermanence is the beginning of enlightenment, to seek the realm of perfect bliss. We are not able to experience our own death. But human beings are the only species in the world to think of death and dying. We should not waste an opportunity to encounter death, the death of others.

They said it is still a relatively new expression, perhaps for the last 10 or 15 years. I asked them their evaluation of the expression, and they replied, "Well, it sounds good." I understand. Funeral directors witness people who cry and mourn before the deceased every day. For them, an expression "celebration of life" must sound pleasant and positive. They like it and may assume those who lost loved ones like the expression.

I do not know who created the expression "celebration of life" but whoever did has been successful in making people relieved even for a moment. This is great. But our life has both a living part and a dying part. Unless we try to find the solution of the dying part our life is incomplete.

A lady who lost her young boy wrote: "Within this world of dream and delusion./ Awaken we must to the frailty of life. My child, now gone, in truth, /The teacher who shows me reality of life." The child's death actually brought the lady Buddha's teaching. The thought of death and dying is not something we should avoid or ignore. Death is not an enemy in our life but rather a friend to deepen our understanding of the reality of life--birth-and death.

Like the lady says that Buddhists see our loved one as our good teacher who taught the life, living part and dying as it is. Through painful and sad experience which no one can avoid we will encounter Amida's great vow which embraces our life, both the living part and dying part as it is. Then and only then are we able to live every day to the fullest without fear and uneasiness.

Report from 2019 JSBTC-WF AGM

Hosted by Vancouver Temple - April 26 - 28

Dana Day funds of \$2,000 per organization will be allocated to Blankets for Canada (started in Lethbridge) and Indspire (helping indigenous students in Canada complete their secondary education)

The used stamps collected across Canada for 2018 raised \$255 for International Save the Children's Fund (\$75 to provide a child with a uniform, text books and stationary for a year, \$75 to stock a medical clinic, \$50 to provide clean water, \$30 to provide medical care – to protect against parasites and vitamin deficiency, and \$25 for fruit trees that will provide food for the family and a crop to sell).

Last year 12 pounds of coins were given to Air Canada, to assist with their charity work.

Youth Funds are available. Temples should encourage their youth to apply for these funds to attend the Japan youth tour and other youth activities.

26 people and 4 ministers are going to the World Buddhist Women's Convention in San Francisco. A song and dance routine will be Canada's entertainment.

Work is continuing on the Terms of Reference and Policies and Procedures.

The 2020 AGM will be in Lethbridge.

Logan Boulet Effect



Most persons attending the Apr. 7 Sunday service wore something with a touch of green to observe Green Shirt Day designated for Logan Boulet, the young Humboldt Broncos hockey team member, who was killed along with 15 others in the horrendous hockey team bus-trailer truck collision on Apr. 6, 2018. Logan died of his injuries in hospital the following day. It was reported six of his organs were transplanted to those in need.

Logan, who was from Lethbridge, gained national and international prominence when he signed a transplant form previously to donate his organs in the event of his death. The so-called Logan Boulet Effect led to an increase in sign-ups for organ donors when his action became known. Green Shirt Day honors Logan's legacy and encourages others to emulate his selfless act.

Gotanye – May 19



Gotanye—the birthday of Shinran—will be observed at the May 19 Sunday service. Shinran Shonin was born on May 21 in 1173 in Kyoto and died at the age of 90 in 1263. He is known as a founder of Jodo Shinshu which belongs to the Pure Land teaching.

Among 84,000 dharma-gates which Shakyamuni Buddha expounded Shinran Shonin declared the Larger Sutra is the true teaching of the Pure Land and others the provisional means of the Pure Land teaching.

The Larger Sutra Shakyamun states: The reason all Buddhas appear in the world is their desire to save the multitudes of beings and by blessing them with the true and real benefit. The true and real benefit is Amida's Vow expressed in Namo Amda Butsu by which all sentient beings are liberated from delusion to enlightenment.

Born into an aristocratic family, the young Shinran—known as Matsuwakamaro—lost both of his parents as a young boy. He eventually met a monk named Honen and became his disciple. In subsequent years, Shinran developed his nembutsu practice that spread among commoners, placing trust in Amida Buddha's compassionate vow.








The traditional hanamido gave children and those observing the monthly memorial service an opportunity to pour sweet tea over the statute of the baby Buddha, re-enacting the myth that sweet rain fell on the baby as he took his first steps.

Shibata sensei, a 14th generation Jodo Shinshu minister from the Buddhist Temple of Florin (CA) gave the dharma message during the service as well as a guest lecture a day earlier.

Shibata sensei's talk on Grief



The process of overcoming grief, in keeping with Shinran's view, was central to Candice Shibata sensei's BTSA talk Apr. 13 in the guest speaker's series. In citing a Shinran scholar on grief, she noted "when you are sad, you don't have to hold back your tears."

She added, however, not to allow oneself

to wallow in sadness in her Power Point presentation entitled "Attachment, Love & Loss: A Shin Perspective of Grief." Grief "provides the path to reflect upon the wounds in your heart and to heal them."

Shibata sensei began on a personal note about having to deal with her mother's death when sensei was young. The process of overcoming her grief took time as she noted that it is a gradual process, however different the process may be for individuals.

Sensei cited Elisabeth Kübler-Ross's stages of grief—denial, anger, bargaining, acceptance—in dealing with death, and related them to Buddhist notions of attachment in the Four Noble Truths

as well as what other psychologists have had to say, all contributing the process.

Quoting a haiku by Prof. Naoki Nabeshima of Ryukoku University, Kyoto, she concluded her presentation: "Tears of sadness/Themselves naturally turn/Into compassion."

Shibata sensei was the guest speaker at the Hanamatsuri service (see previous article) the following day. She is the minister at the Buddhist Church of Florin, CA. She has a master's degree in counseling psychology as well as in Buddhist Studies. She is of the 14th generation to be a Buddhist minister in her family.
