



Sangha BUDDHIST KINSHIP

We have a Buddhist organization called the Jodo Shinshu Buddhist Temples of Canada. During the last weekend in April, we hosted its annual general meeting. Exactly four years ago, on April 26, 2009, we had the dedication ceremony for our new temple in conjunction with JSBTC annual general meeting. Time really flies.

Since then, our Sangha, our Buddhist kinship, has continued to grow beyond the boundary of ethnicity. Of course, it was not an easy road to come this far after the amalgamation of five existing temples into one. But many members and friends have been supportive with their generous donations, time and labour. They were, and still are, interested in expanding and supporting the circle of the Dharma, the universal Law revealed by the Buddha. The temple facilities are also used for many activities related to Buddhism. These activities are not possible without the beautiful temple building, for that we are very grateful.

Needless to say, there is no Sangha without Dharma. Furthermore, the Sangha is for the Dharma and not the other way around. I often think that Sangha is like a lamp which is made of clear glass to protect a flame inside. (I am talking about an old style lamp!) The flame inside is the Dharma. In this analogy, the Sangha is the outer form to protect the flame, the Dharma.

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It is interesting to note how the Sangha started. More than 2500 years ago, five monks including Siddhartha Gautama, a future Buddha, were practicing the way to Enlightenment (moksha in Sanskrit), release from delusion. But on the way, they abandoned Siddhartha when they saw him receive a meal from a village girl during their practice, asceticism. Siddhartha did not see asceticism or self-torture as the way to Enlightenment. Later, when Siddhartha experienced Enlightenment, two laymen became his first followers. The monks who had left Siddhartha earlier also looked up to him as their teacher and joined the Sangha. This is the beginning of the Sangha. Then nuns and, still later, more lay followers were accepted. The Sangha became a Buddhist organization of kinship. The Sangha gradually grew. With the passage of time, although the flame burned brightly as ever, it is natural that the outer form of the lamp would soon become tainted and unclean. Similarly, people, due to their strong selfish minds, are apt to forget the golden rule; "the Sangha is for the Dharma".

From time to time, therefore, we must examine the Sangha, the outer form. To examine the Sangha means to examine ourselves as if our life is based on the Dharma. Jodo Shinshu emphasizes *cho-mon* (聴聞), constant listening and deep hearing of the Dharma expressed in Namu Amida Butsua, a compassionate call out of Buddha's Vow to release all sentient beings from delusion. We, Jodo Shinshu followers, are not required to engage in traditional practices such as keeping many precepts, practicing long hours of meditation, cultivating true wisdom in order to find peace of mind in our daily lives.

Through *cho-mon*, however, we must constantly examine our life in the light of Buddha's wisdom and compassion and thereby return in gratitude and joy to the realm of the Buddha that always sustains our life. Let's continue to expand the circle of the Dharmam of Namu Amida Butsu, the heart of our Sangha!

旧仏教会が併合され、新しいお寺になって、丸4年の歳月があつという間に過ぎました。早いものだなあ、とつくづく思います。建築資金を募っていたころ、「親鸞聖人は、一生お寺を持たなかった。なぜお寺を建てる必要がありますか。」と言っておられた方が、今では、お寺を人一倍、利用しておられます。建物がなければ、聞法も文化活動もなかなか出来るものではありません。聖人は確かにご自分のお寺を持つということはありませんでした。当時、お寺を持つということは、まず権力者(パトロン)の擁護が必要であったのです。聖人は、自ら権力者に近づく、ということにはなかつたようです。聖人が特に親しく近づかれた人々は、「獵師、商人、さまざまのものは、みな、石、かわら、つぶてのごとくなるわれらなり。」といわれたように、地位も、名誉も権力もない人々との繋がりでした。そのような人々と共に、み仏の大悲を仰ぎ、よろこび、安心して生きられたのです。聖人が逝きて750年。損得勘定の激しい世の中で、喧騒の日々の中で、今も多くの人々から、深く慕われ、敬われているということは、不思議なことであり、有難いことという他ありません。 合掌 泉

Business affairs were followed by a festive banquet on Saturday (April 27) and a bento lunch on Sunday (April 28) after a memorial service for the JSBTC.

The delegates to the AGM and temple members were entertained by boys of the taiko group and girls of the Junior Minyo dancers.

April also saw the celebration of Hanamatsuri at which Dr. Tony Barber of the University of Calgary was the featured speaker. The large crowd, which also was observing the monthly memorial service, filled the hondo and enjoyed a supper prepared by Toban 4.

Entertainment also included the taiko players, young dancers and the choir, joined by the Dharma School students, who sang "Amida's Golden Chain of Love" and "Golden Chain." Please see photos from the day elsewhere in the Hikari.

It was a highly demanding month for Toban 4 and the otera truly appreciates all the work it provided to make Hanamatsuri and the JSBTC AGMeetings pleasurable. Thanks too to all the temple volunteers for assisting in hosting JSBTC.

The temple was scheduled to invite Rytch Newmiller of the Deaf and Hard-of-Hearing Society in May to set up and adjust headphones for interested members, allowing them to hear dharma talks clearly. To this end, the board at its April meeting agreed to pay a deposit to the Hearing Society for half the cost of the system, quoted at \$4,677.

The board also:

- received a membership committee report that the Movie Night at the Movie Mill for the showing of "Little Buddha" had a full theatre (capacity 116) and was well-attended. Donations of \$260 were received to offset the cost, and BTSA paid \$140;
- voted to give an honorarium of \$400 to Dr. Rachael Crowder who conducted the mindfulness meditation class. BTSA received \$410 for a meditation day retreat held by Dr. Crowder in March;
- agreed to a suggestion made that the oshoko line at monthly memorial services be organized to facilitate the process; and,
- heard that BTSA will propose to the Living Dharma Centre that funds be made available for a 60-inch TV screen and an Apple TV projector for the Dharma classroom audio-visual projects.

Just a reminder that minutes of all board meetings are available in the temple library area and are open to any interested members to peruse.

BUDDHIST Q & A

What is Jodo Shinshu? 浄土真宗とは？

The literal translation of Jodo Shinshu is the True Essence of Pure Land. The term is used as a name of a Buddhist organization as well as its teaching. Originally, Jodo Shinshu is one of 13 traditional Buddhist sects in Japan. Jodo Shinshu teaches that the Pure Land is true and real realm full of wisdom. We often think that the world we live in is true and real. This is so-called the upside down view or the view of ordinary people of delusion. From the view of the Buddha, Enlightened being, our world is a temporary and a burning house of impermanence in which we suffer due to our egocentricity. The Buddha is always working to awaken us to what kind of situation we are in. (Y.I.)

Home Butsudan Available for Purchase

Two Buddhist home shrines (butsudan) are available for purchase through the BTSA. Izumi sensei has two Japanese-made butsudan samples that interested persons can examine and purchase. Once an order is received, it will be transmitted to the company in Japan for shipment.

The one pictured on the left is the smaller of the two models and is called ozushi: height, 30 cm x width, 16 cm x depth, 13 cm. It costs \$400. The dimensions of the larger model are: height, 43 cm x width, 33 cm x depth, 24 cm. Cost is \$500. Cost includes shipment and ornaments—flower vase, candle holder and incense burner (as pictured).

It also is possible to purchase only the butsudan, less the cost of the ornaments.

The Amida scroll inside is additional and is either \$35 or \$65 (the latter displayed in the ozushi). The \$35 scroll may be displayed in either butsudan.

Harry Gyokyo Bridge sensei, the resident minister of the Buddhist Church of Oakland, CA, will be the BTSA guest for the 2013 Obon on July 21. From the Oakland temple website, he is described thusly: He "spent various parts of his youth in both Tokyo and the Boston area. He encountered Buddhism while in college, and although he had dreams of becoming a professional musician, he instead found his way into the Buddhist ministry. He received Masters Degrees from both the Institute of Buddhist Studies in Berkeley, California and Ryukoku University in Kyoto, Japan. Rev. Bridge served as the resident minister of the Buddhist Church of Lodi for two and a half years, and was assigned to the Buddhist Church of Oakland in January of 2009. Besides Buddhism, his interests include music and reading (mostly science fiction and fantasy)."
