Information To learn Buddhism is to learn about ourselves



Generally speaking, we tend to think that to become a Buddhist means to get a lot of information about Buddhism, gain knowledge of its teachings and become intellectual. But is this true? If true, all Buddhists must become scholars of Buddhism and all scholars of Buddhism must be Buddhists. I think there must be greater urgency to becoming a Buddhist than merely collecting an abundance of information.

Four months ago, my wife went to Portland, Oregon, to help one of our daughters, Betty, who had slipped on the steps and broke her leg in three places during her pregnancy. My wife stayed there for two months to help her. Fortunately, Betty had a healthy baby girl. My wife came home and shared her stories she heard while in Portland, one of which Betty had told her. Actually I was a bit surprised, but it gave me food for reflection.

This was the story Betty told after her surgery at the hospital: because of the broken leg, an ambulance came to take her to hospital. In route, the ambulance attendant asked Betty to fill out a sheet of paper which had many questions

about personal information. While Betty was completing the form, and answering questions, the attendant did not do anything to the leg though part of a bone had broken through the skin. Agonizing and enduring her pain, Betty filled out the paper and answered all questions. The attendant then looked at the paper, made sure she got all the necessary information and then asked Betty to sign the paper.

Listening to my wife, I wondered about the way the attendant acted although I understood it was standard procedure to get medical information. Then, I remembered a story that appears in the Buddhist text. One day a man was struck by a poisoned arrow. His friends came to the rescue and tried to immediately pull the arrow out. But he stopped and asked them the following questions. Who shot the arrow? Was it a man or a woman? What was the bow made of? Who made the poison? I want to know about all these information before the arrow is removed.

Here are two stories. Each story is different in context but appears to me to have a similarity: The ambulance attendant did not do anything until all information was gotten from the wounded woman. To the attendant, getting information seemed more important than treating, even temporarily, the wound at once. In the same way, it was more immediate for the man who was struck by a poisoned arrow to get information rather than to pull it out.

Buddhism talks about examination and reflection of ourselves first, for no matter when and where we live, our life is limited and changing. There are so many ways to get information around us, from radio and newspaper, from T.V. and internet. Buddhism cautions us not to be fooled by an overabundance of information which

seems to be happening in modern times in particular. Are we not becoming hungry ghosts of information? It is always true in Buddhism that “to learn Buddhism is to learn about ourselves.” That’s what we Buddhists do first and immediately.

教えに会う、あるいは教えを聞く、という場合、八つの障害があるといわれます。つまり、聞くことを邪魔する八つの要因です。まず耳が不自由であったり、体が悪かったりすると、なかなか教えを聞くことが出来ません。また、暑すぎたり、寒すぎたりすると、教えを聞こうという気分になれません。また、地位や身分が高すぎると、とかく教えを見下し、聞こうとしません。生活が貧しいと、聞くどころではありません。かといって生活が楽になると、聞くことに怠惰となります。そして、多くの知識、情報を持つと、とかく教えを聞かなくなるのです。自分が一番、と驕慢(きょうまん)になるからです。しかし、仏様の広大な智慧と慈悲は、そのような障害をつきやぶって、「私を真実世界に目覚まさせるために」働いてくださるのです。法の働きは、どなたも邪魔することは出来ないのです。昔の方は、「仏法は毛穴からでも入る」といわれました。だからと言って、聞法に関して、横着していてもかまわない、ということではないのでしょうか。これは、法(教え)の働きに遇った人の「よろこび」の言葉なのです。教えに育てられた人の「感謝」の表現なのです。いよいよ聞法いたしましょう。合掌 泉康雄

BTSA NOTES

After a relatively subdued summer—punctuated by the major Obon celebration in July—BTSA activities are on the upswing with the return of the autumn season. We hope everyone enjoyed a relaxing, leisurely break.

The informal summer Sunday services give way to the regular schedule with the monthly memorial service on Sept. 4. While the attendance remained steady, I think the main benefit from holding services throughout the summer was the number of guests who visited the temple.

The temple will be buzzing throughout the remainder of September with the Jodo Shinshu Buddhist Temples of Canada ministerial association meeting Sept. 14 thru the 17, including a day session on the 16th with the JSBTC board. The board will meet on their own on the 17th. (Please see related story in this newsletter.)

Newly-installed socho, Grant Ikuta sensei, will be the guest speaker at our regular service on Sept. 18, during which time a Sarana Affirmation service is scheduled for any interested members. Please see Izumi sensei if you're interested in participating. JSBTC requires a \$30 fee for the ceremony.

Socho will remain the few days after the ministerial meeting and would like to meet with as many temple members as possible to discuss a variety of matters about Jodo Shinshu in Canada following his Sunday guest appearance.

The scheduled mein-making session, with co-chairs Jan Okamura and Pat Sassa, will be held on Sept. 17, and we're hoping to make enough mein noodles for the Fall Chow Mein Supper that's set for Oct. 15, from 1 to 5 p.m. Another session will be planned later on to make mein for sale to members. More details about the supper will be forthcoming in the next Hikari, but we ask all members to be prepared to give a hand to put on this major fund raiser.

The temple crew, with Roland Ikuta as chair, will be working Sept. 13 and 14 at the casino as part of our fund-raising activities. The proceeds will help go towards the maintenance of the temple, just as the proceeds from the previous casino in 2008 were used for a variety of purposes stipulated by the Alberta Liquor and Gaming Commission. Thanks to all the volunteers, some who agreed to work the long shift into the wee morning hours.

Temple movie nights also return this month, with a feature film entitled "Pay It Forward" to be screened on Sept. 24, following a barbecue. Please see an accompanying article for greater details. The film will help to set the stage for the Alberta Buddhist Conference which has adopted the title as its theme. The ABC is set for Oct. 28, 29 and 30. Please register as soon as possible by using the form included elsewhere in this month's Hikari.

Since August was a slow month without a newsletter, it's worth noting here that our bon odori in Galt Gardens on July 16 occurred without a hitch. Thanks to all the hard-working volunteers who put together another great summer festival. Many thanks, too, to our obon service guest speaker, James Martin sensei of Calgary Buddhist Temple,

At its July meeting, the board:

- voted to purchase five one-year redeemable GICs, each for \$25,000, from Alberta Treasury Branch at a rate of 1.5 per cent. While the return may not appear overly generous, it was deemed better to invest even a little as opposed to allowing the amount to sit in temple accounts with next to no interest;
- approved sending \$5,000 to Nishi Hongwanji. This is the annual limit allowed by the Canadian government for any overseas financial transfer. The \$5,000 is a portion of the BTSA assessment of \$5,744 for the 750th commemoration of Shinran's memorial. The balance, \$744, will be remitted in 2012. JSBTC's assessment for the event totalled \$50,000; and
- was advised that a doorbell for the temple has been installed, but still needs adjustments to increase the sound volume.

The board also approved on Aug. 20 by email vote the installation of eight additional electrical outlet, each with its own circuit, in the Multipurpose Room by Corona Electric Ltd. at the quoted price of \$1,895.00 plus GST. This will help set up mein-noodle making equipment without having to use extra long extension cords to plugs outside of the Multipurpose Room.

The conference also features James Martin sensei of the Calgary Buddhist Temple, several short Buddhist-themed videos, and a panel discussion. Other items planned are a Dharma class session, Japan youth tour reports, the temple choir presentation and, we hope, a short talk by Margaret Benson who spent time teaching English at a Thai monestary.

The registration for this year’s conference is \$65 and includes all the foregoing as well as a banquet, Saturday and Sunday lunches, and coffee breaks. The major benefit is priceless—the chance to listen, meet and enjoy the fellowship.

BUDDHIST Q & A

Why are 7th day services held?

Generally speaking it is Buddhist custom in which a deceased enters his or her next life after a period of seven times seven (49) days. The services are held for the sake of the deceased. In Jodo Shinshu Buddhism (Shin Buddhism) we understand and appreciate that the deceased is born in the Pure Land and will become a Buddha instantaneously when the death occurs. For Jodo Shinshu followers the 7th day services may become an occasion to cherish the memory of our loved one and at the same time a precious opportunity for the living to listen to the Dharma, life which is true and real. Thus the Buddhist custom continues but its implication, therefore, differ from Buddhism in general.
